This file contains data on the number of students in each district who were eligible for and participated in Title I / NCLB School Choice and supplemental educational services (SES) in Massachusetts public schools during the 2009-10 school year.

About Title I / NCLB School Choice

Under the federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB), a school that does not make Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) in English language arts (ELA) or mathematics in the aggregate and/or for student subgroups for two consecutive years is considered to be in its first year of improvement status. While a school receiving federal Title I funds is in improvement status, the district is required to offer all students enrolled in the school the option to transfer to another public school served by the district that has not been identified for school improvement.

About Supplemental Educational Services (SES)

Supplemental Educational Services (SES) are additional, free, academic instruction designed to increase the academic achievement of students in schools identified for improvement, corrective action or restructuring under NCLB. Students from low-income families attending Title I schools in their second year of school improvement (i.e., have not made AYP for three or more years), in corrective action, or in restructuring status are eligible to receive SES.

Funding for Choice and SES

Each school district with Title I schools required to offer Title I / NCLB School Choice or SES must reserve up to an amount equal to 20 percent of its federal Title I, Part A allocation, from which the district must spend: an amount equal to 5 percent for choice-related transportation; an amount equal to 5 percent to provide SES; and an amount equal to the remaining 10 percent for choice-related transportation, SES, or both, as the district determines.

NOTE: Participation data contained in this file were reported to the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education by school districts. All other data and calculations were compiled by the Department.
